### chairman's remarks


Since British Waterways Board gave our Society permission to explore Dungebooth Lock we have had many meetings with British Waterways Board Office and Greater Manchester County Council members and officers to determine who pays the extra repair and maintenance costs once the section from Wade Lock to Wool Road is restored.

British Waterways Board consider that the extra annual cost of maintaining this stretch of remainder waterway to cruising standards will be averaged at £4,500 per annum. The Board has agreed not to levy any repair and maintenance charge until the complete section is fully restored.

We have persuaded Greater Manchester Council that a restored canal will be a significant feature in the Tame Valley and that as a first step the restored Uppermill stretch will provide a recreational facility for boat passengers, anglers, industrial archaeologists, gongoozlers and visitors to the three historical centres - soon to be all open to the public.

I can now announce that Greater Manchester Council has undertaken to bear the repair and maintenance charge. This undertaking by Greater Manchester Council not only enables the Society to pursue 'official' sources of funds but also gives the Huddersfield Narrow restoration project official recognition.

We are very grateful to members and officers of the Greater Manchester Council and British Waterways Board for bringing our localised political campaign to a successful conclusion. This is only the beginning. Your Council is continuing to investigate similar schemes to achieve our long term objectives.

#### uppermill progress report

As expected the weather stopped all work, and with Christmas and the New Year following, work did not start till 17th January. We used this time to finalise the purchase of a van, which has greatly improved the transporting of equipment.

At present it resides between working parties in Russwell Narrowboats yard in Ashton and I would like to thank Tony Bramwell for all his assistance. The hiring season will soon be starting and Tony will need the space for the hirers' cars. We therefore need to find a new home for the van and I would ask all local members to assist in the search please. The van is a Ford Luton 'A' series Box van, the height is 12 feet, the width 8 feet and length 25 feet. Any secure compound or garage would be suitable.

The garage in which our trailer lives is now required by its new owners so a new home will also have to be found for this.

The bywash was completed, minus pointing, so that work could be resumed in the lock chamber. We were though once again confronted by the usual problem, water. Too much of it in the chamber. Solution? - Pump - we have been most generously assisted in this by two Oldham firms. Next problem, barrow hoists, as mentioned last issue the WRG hoist was broken and we would be needing two hoists for the Sheffield IWA Weekend.

Spare parts were ordered and to cut a long story short it was back in operation on the Friday evening. Saturday dawned dry and clear, what was this? Where was the downpour that normally greets our visiting groups?

The weekend was very productive and we hope it will be the first of many such weekends this year. The paddle culverts were exposed late on Sunday afternoon, so inspection of these will have to wait. We now have a hole 30 feet long in the centre of the chamber, so now have somewhere in the region of 70 cubic yards of infill remaining.

A lot of support is certainly being voiced by locals and visitors alike to this project, so we are winning on two fronts. As I said last issue Nick Wright who organises WRG workcamps visited the project and he and I are making plans for this August, when they will be tackling Lock 23W - Lime Kiln Lock (Aqueduct Lock). Any local members are welcome to join, in fact we will need locals on site during work camp fortnight to stay to assist with the problems encounted on 'away' sites. So if anyone can contribute please let me know.

One of our next tasks will be to construct a dam at the tail of the lock so that the bottom gate recesses and remains of the concrete wall can be cleared. Greater Manchester Conservation Volunteers will also be attending working parties continuing their work on the towpath wall.

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Very little has been done to Stan since my last report, due in part to the bad weather if you remember we had a little snow last month!! and also the Christmas Holidays. However some progress has been made, the propellor has been straightened (and polished - it seems a sharne to hide it under water!) by Mr. Hickson of Crowther (Royton) Ltd., who has done a very good job. So if you want a propellor seen to, 1, can highly recommend him. (Plug, I know but he deserves it.) The new hatch has been fitted and a start made on modification to the stern. An electronic controller has been ordered from Cableform Ltd., which will replace the existing lash-up, which is nearing the end of its useful life, and make control of the boat easier. No more stopping by hitting the bank because you can't find reverse in a hurry.

We are having a working party on Saturday 13th. Feb. so hopefully more work will have been done to report in the next issue.

More working parties are proposed so if you would like to help please get in touch with me for time, dates etc.

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For the first time in ten years we've been defeated by a combination of awful weather and innumerable stoppages. "Tyseley" never made it back to base. She is still in Stoke on-Trent, and that is where we shall be starting our 1982 Waterways Tour. It will begin on 24th May, and finish Saturday, 30th October (I hope you all turn up for the last night)! We shall be boating for a month less than last year. This enables us to do four weeks of local land-based touring in the South Pennines. We are aiming to perform in the Home Valley, The Calder Valley and Saddleworth, as well as in our own Colne Valley, doing venues in Slaithwaite and Milnsbridge, and running for a whole week at the Mechanics' Institute in Marsden (don't worry, there'll be a bar)!

The Mechanics' Institute is shortly to be refurbished with a grant from Kirklees Council. The Marsden Community Association and ourselves will be based there, working together to provide arts, entertainment and leisure activities, particularly for the people of Marsden, but also for anyone who cares to come along and enjoy themselves. This does not mean, however, that Mikron is giving up the Waterways - our seasons will just be a little shorter than in previous years.

To emphasise our concern for the area we live in, Mikron's new show this year will be about the Pennines - the story of how the different methods of transport which have been used to cross this natural barrier have affected the landscape, the industry and the lives of the Pennine People. There will be lots of Humour, music and song as usual. We are also reviving the show first performed in 1974 - 'keep yer hands off' which traces the origins of the narrowboat people and attempts to discover how their traditions and unique way of life developed; how they were affected by the arrival of the railways and, later, motorways.

### review of 1981 - part 2



The Tameside Canals Festival, chaired by Colin Chadwick was attended by thousands and raised over £2,000. A meeting was arranged by Saddleworth Parish Brownhill and Woolroad. One of the Tunnel End Cottages at Marsden which the Society hope to lease from BWB is to be a West Yorkshire M.C.C. Countryside... Ranger base. West Yorkshire will restore both cottages under a Manpower Services scheme. This will run together with Kirklees Council's scheme for a picnic site. The Society's postcards of Tunnel End went on sale. Excavation progressed slowly at Dungebooth lock, Uppermill. Meetings were held at the 'Station' Ashton, and the Four Horseshoes, Milnsbridge - a talk by Fred Andrews on Continental Waterways.

#### August

David Sumner and Bob Dewey discussed restoration of the canal between Ashton and Stalybridge with Tameside and Greater Manchester Councils. The Towpath Guide was launched at the Colne Valley Museum, Golcar with the help of a loan from West Yorkshire M.C.C. That Council also produced a welcome report on the benefits of canal restoration. The IWA National Rally was held in Leeds with 'Restore Huddersfield Canal' stickers everywhere! Meetings held at the 'Railway' Marsden, and the 'Waggon' Uppermill.

### town planning column

The latest local plan covering the canal is Kirklees Council Huddersfield Town Centre Plan. Kirklees already has a policy that no development encroaching on the canal or towpath will be permitted, subject to each planning application being considered on its merits. This is now strengthened in the Town Centre Plan to include detached sections and filled or culverted lengths, and the policy is to be applied strictly. Any proposals on filled or culverted sections will have to provide for eventual restoration on the original line of the canal, or a satisfactory diversion. It is also expected that development or redevelopment schemes will provide waterside paths.

The justification for these policies runs to 2 full pages. It refers to the increased public awareness of the recreational value of canals. Our canal is said to have...'Far more than local significance because of its historical importance as a trans-Pennine Canal with the longest tunnel..." and is seen as an important element in developing tourist potential.

Although no actual proposals for restoration are made this is considered "No less realistic than several successful restorations of disused canals and railways..."

"...The council recognises the benefits that a restored canal would bring not only in recreational and environmental terms, but also economically..." but it seems its present role as "...Essentially one of ensuring that the task of restoration is not made any more difficult..."

Kirklees is apparantly aware of the potential. Is it too much to hope that the expected Colne Valley Local Plan will include actual restoration proposals.

#### **Sheffield Branch**

Since last reported the Sheffield Branch have had a couple of meetings mostly discussing plans for HCS promotions at this year's Tameside Canals Festival. We have come up with various ideas which include such things as traditional fairground activities and selling promotional certificates towards restoration. The main emphasis we felt, must be on trying to make each and every visitor aware of the Society and its basic aims. To this end we plan on using a tent for a film show and short talk on the canal and display of posters and information around the site. We also have plans afoot for stressing the local Tameside aspect of the Huddersfield Narrow including a children's painting competition and a guided towpath walk. Some of us, no names mentioned, have volunteered to dress as Diggles over the weekend.

These ideas and many more are very much in the early stages. If any Sheffield area members can attend our next meetings, we need your support in getting things off the ground in order to make this year's festival even more successful.

As a branch we are slowly growing and have a couple of events lined up such as a trip on the Chesterfield Canal on March 7th - Fully Booked- and a trip on the 12th April to Hazelhurst Junction and Frogall. 

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#### September

David Sumner wrote to West Yorkshire and Kirklees Councils suggesting six restoration projects (prepared by Dave Finnis, your Editor, her husband Keith and Bob Dewey) using Manpower Services Funds. Hazel Maskell organised a sponsored walk from Stalybridge to Diggle which raised over £450. The Society's float was at Marsden Festival when 'Stan' and Colin Witter's steamboat 'option' gave trips to Tunnel End. Meetings were held at the 'Commercial' Slaithwaite, a talk by Brian Holden on the Rochdale Canal, the Stamford Arms at Stalybridge, 'The Great Western' Standedge, a talk on early motor transport by Mike Howarth, and the White Lion at Sheffield.

The Rochdale Canal Society's month! They held a 'Big Dig' at Chadderton with more than 100 navvies, including HCS members, and Calderdale and West Yorkshire Councils announced a Manpower Services scheme to restore their Canal between Hebden Bridge and Todmorden.

#### October

Planning permission for the restoration of the infilled section, between Brownhill and Woolroad was granted by Oldham M.B.C. 44 members went in a coach to Dudley Tunnel. The IWA Manchester Branch held a dinghy Rally at Uppermill. 'Stan' was giving trips at weekends to Dungebooth Lock where visitors could see work progressing. £150 was granted by Greater Manchester Council towards this scheme. Meeting were held at the 'Diggle Hotel' Diggle, 'The Fat Cat' Sheffield and the 'White Cross' Bradley, a talk by Fred Andrews on the Aire and Calder Navigation. **November** 


The Society was the second highest recipient of Funds from the Shell Awards scheme with a total of £1,100. A meeting about the Ashton-Stalybridge secton of the canal was attended by David Sumner, Bob Dewey and Officers of Greater Manchester and Tameside Councils, Manpower Services Commission and BWB. Kirklees Council decided to build a car park at Tunnel End, Marsden. To reduce the tax on sales, a trading subsidiary, Loxvend Ltd. was established. More than 100 members attended a bonfire at the Marsden home of Phil and Doris Dyson. A Celidh was held at Friezland Hall, Greenfield and a Cheese and Wine Party at Uppermill Museum. Four Calder Cruiser's narrowboats took members from Brighouse on the Calder and Hebble. A meeting was held at the 'Old Hunters Tavern' Stalybridge. **December** 

The Councils in the Tame Valley agreed to fund the additional maintenance costs of the restored section at Uppermill - a most important decision! The lease of Tunnel End Cottages between the Society, West Yorkshire and BWB was not yet agreed. Dave Finnis organised another sponsored pub crawl around Marsden which raised over £500. 'Stan' was in winter quarters for repairs. Meetings were held at 'The Fat Cat' Sheffield, 'The Four Horseshoes' Milnsbridge - A talk on canal tunnels by Robin Witter 'the Tollemache Arms' Mossley and 'The Diggle Hotel' Diggle.


