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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



THE FOLLOWING is the text of my report to be published shortly in our first Annual Report. The report is addressed to bodies both public and private and to individuals who can help the Society restore the Canal. It is worth reminding ourselves from time to time of the task ahead and to reflect on the achievements to date.

Two recent events centred on the Huddersfield Canal show how co-operation between the private, public and voluntary sectors can produce successful partnerships. I refer to the reopening of the Tunnel End Canal and Countryside Centre and the Kirkless Canal Festival.

The Kirklees Canal Festival attracted many boats to the canal on the attractive Polytechnic site in the centre of Huddersfield. The event, well organised by Ian France and his team, was supported by private industry as well as the Council and British Waterways. Our Patron was Viscount Lewisham, who as a riparian landowner in the upper Colne Valley sees the restoration of the canal as a major catalyst for the regeneration of the canal corridor. His enthusiasm for our project has led us to discuss future plans including the Tunnel with him. He was particularly impressed by the Mayor of Kirklees' address at the opening ceremony, where Councillor T. O'Donavan pledged his support for full restoration.

The Tunnel End Centre re-opening ceremony was another example of co-operation bringing benefits to all the community. Kirklees Council have completely renovated the cottages and produced a new exhibition about the canal, the Trans-Pennine routes, and the Countryside. The National Trust have a ranger service based at Tunnel End and David Finnis our Society representative with the NT ensures that visitors to this delightful centre are reminded of the canal's role in the Colne Valley. The exhibition in the 'canal room' is a credit to Kirklees and as the Mayor stated, Sue McBride who designed and produced the new show deserves many congratulations.

THE REPORT

WHEN WRITING THIS REPORT, we have already moved into the 90's and a new decade of commitment which is required from many thousands of supporters who will make it possible to achieve the mammoth objectives that the Huddersfield Canal Society have set.

It all started in 1974 with a handful of waterway enthusiasts who met to discuss how to arrest the decline of the Huddersfield Narrow Canal which had been abandoned in 1968 and classified as a remainder waterway. The Huddersfield Canal Society was formed in April of 1974 whilst the last few locks in Greenfield and Stalybridge were being infilled. Now, sixteen years later, over half of the seventy-four locks have been restored, and seven of the twenty miles of canal has been dredged.

We were told the canal would never be restored to navigable status. So, in 1981, we began restoration on two locks in Uppermill and three years later the public cruised through this 'new' tourist attraction. This prompted large scale restoration, first in Kirklees, then in Tameside and Oldham.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The relatively easy sectors have been almost completed and the Society is now looking at new methods to provide the impetus to enable restoration to be completed this century. The Standedge Tunnel is our largest project and will cost more than £5m to restore. In 1989 our report on Standedge Tunnel was published, which explained how this physical waterway could be restored. The study, funded by all three local authorities, British Waterways, the Society, the Sports Council and the European Commission, presents a challenge. Sources of the funds required have not yet been identified, but we believe that the tunnel is the key to the success of the restoration scheme as it will provide a massive tourist attraction to both sides of the Pennines. The benefits of restoring the Huddersfield Narrow Canal outlined in the 1986 study by L. & R. Leisure Consultants may be summarised as follows:

- Job Creation 230 permanent, full-time employment opportunities in the leisure, tourism and associated service industries. 260 jobs directly associated with the ten year restoration programme.
- Local Economy Expenditure by visitors enjoying the leisure and tourism activities will result in over £2m per year being retained in the local region, thus stimulating local employment.
- Improved Environment Restoration will create a high quality 'green' backdrop against which local residents can live, work, learn and enjoy their leisure time.
- Stimulated Inward Investment Improved quality of the environment through canal restoration will provide the catalyst to attract new business into the canal corridor and strengthen economic regeneration. Indeed, I am pleased that the Civic Trust are to promote a study, with the co-operation of the authorities, of the canal regeneration corridor.

Reorganisation of the Society involving local authority councillors and a major fund-raising initiative will I believe harness more local authority support and involve more of our members and the public at large. Early estimates indicated that with inflation the final costs of restoration could be in excess of £10m. We need to strengthen community fund raising, tap the corporate sector and argue our case more effectively with the public sector. A public asset such as this canal can attract much private sector funding to lever out public sector funds and we are addressing ourselves to this new challenge. During 1989, our very loyal and valued volunteers continued to restore the canal at Diggle and are looking forward to their next lock restoration project. We have held festivals attracting many thousands to events on the canal, most notably the annual Ashton and Kirklees Canal Festivals. The Society is involved in maintaining canalside monuments and buildings and above all we attempt to promote the canal for the benefits of all the community.

We must approach this new decade with even more determination and vigour to achieve our objectives. We are in our 10th year of actual restoration, and we need your support to help us complete our task by the year 2000. My thanks to all who have contributed to our work over the past year; please continue to give us your support. To those who are new to our campaign, welcome, and you, like all our supporters, can take pride in the fact that we are restoring a monument to the efforts of our forefathers for the benefit of future generations.

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
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KIRKLEES CANALS FESTIVAL 1990

The 4th Kirklees Canal Festival was opened by its Patron, Viscount Lewisham, on 1st September 1990. Our President, Tom Megahy, MEP, was also present at the Festival and attended the Opening Ceremony. The Mayoralty from the canal's corridor were among other VIP guests at the Ceremony. This distinguished gathering (and our Chairman!!) enjoyed a short canal cruise (marred only by an old mattress and a supermarket trolley in the water) before the ceremony.

The weather was kind to us, despite threatening skies on Sunday morning. However, gusty winds did prove a problem for the duck race, with most ducks swimming in the wrong direction and others not moving at all! The problem of actually persuading the ducks to go in the right direction was bravely solved by hitching two boats together in the middle of the canal and turning their engines on to create a 'current' for the ducks. Special mention must go to Rod, who burnt out the engine of his boat whilst performing this noble act.

The varied entertainments were well received, in particular the Holmfirth High School Steel Band, and Juckalo the Juggler. Other attractions were a model railway, boat trips on Calder Lady and Doreen, children's roundabout, Barney the robot police dog, bouncing fun castle, canoe race (sponsored by Redlands Aggregates Ltd.), Paul Petulengro – palmist (sponsored by Schofield & Smith Ltd.), and the chance to win a brand new car by throwing 7 dice to get 7 sixes (in one go!) (sponsored by Brockholes Ltd. and Ramsden's Landing). Unfortunately no-one was lucky enough to drive away the car,

On Saturday there was the now traditional evening's entertainment from the Mikron Theatre Company. Their performance of Free for All' was up to their usual excellent standard. In addition, we had a bustling crafts market which included stalls from both commercial traders and voluntary groups. In fact, one voluntary Church group raised around £200 just on Saturday by selling cakes! They immediately booked their space for next year!

This year the Festival attracted around 40 visiting boats, the most ever seen (OK, so there were more at Ashton, but they do have ten years start on us!), Prizes were awarded for the best decorated boat and for the boat that had travelled the furthest distance to the Festival. These prizes were kindly donated by Franz Orthodontia and Peak & Pennine Outdoor Equipment. Instead of an ordinary raffle, we decided this year to have a lucky draw, entry forms for which were included on the programme (did you return yours?). The prize was a specially commissioned Canal Lamp, designed by Brian Stephenson and featured in the last Pennine Link. Our thanks must go to Sagar Marine who sponsored the Lucky Draw.



VISCOUNT LEWISHAM

FESTIVAL HAS NEW PATRON

A NEW PATRON has been announced for the Huddersfield Canal Festival.

Canal Festival chairman Ian France said Viscount Lewisham had professed an interest in the continuing restoration project of the Huddersfield Narrow Canal and had agreed to become Festival Patron.

Mr. France said Viscount Lewisham, son of Colne Valley landowner the Earl of Dartmouth, saw the restoration as creating new opportunities for leisure and outdoor pursuits.

Viscount Lewisham is head of the West Riding Cable Group, recently successful in winning the contract to bring the TV system to homes in the Huddersfield area and other parts of West Yorkshire.

He opened the September 1-2 Festival after arriving by waterbus with a party of civic dignitaries. The Festirval featured a boat rally, boat trips, canoe racing, displays of narrow boats, British Waterways exhibits, morris dancing, local bands, children's amusements, a cafe, bar and licensed restaurant. The event came to a close with Sunday's Great Duck Race.

















COMMERCIAL CARRYING on the HUDDERSFIELD NARROW CANAL

This article should have appeared in the last issue of Pennine Link, being pertinent to the Ashton Canals Festival. Somehow it escaped. I think it crept out of the folder when no-one was looking. Sorry Brian, but better late than never. Ed.

The first commercial load for nearly 60 years was carried on the Huddersfield Narrow Canal on the Friday morning prior to the

Ashton Canals Festival. The Stamford Group Mailbox International loan waste bins to the Festival Committee each year and, as their premises are just above Lock 3, it was felt that the collection should be by water, so Bill Holmes of the Ashton Packet Boat Company was contacted. He has just completed a superb renovation of the 70/80 year-old n.b. Joel.

As there is no winding hole on this newly-opened stretch of the HNC, the first problem was that progress up to the Stamford Group HQ had to be in reverse, so much of the muscle power of the lads from HCS Restoration Ltd. was enlisted to pull Joel. As they had all been involved in the actual restoration of this section, they enjoyed the chance to make their efforts worthwhile.

A nasty wind funnel just out of Whitelands Tunnel caused a further problem and we had a 70ft. narrowboat proceeding sideways up the 40 ft. wide canal for a short distance. Joel, being a dignified old man, looked a little disgruntled at this sort of treatment.

The bottom gate on Lock 2 caused another problem but, with a very experienced crew on board, the guys who actually rebuilt the lock operating the windlasses and advice from the substantial figure on British Waterways Lengthman Fred, who is based in Marsden and covers the whole of the narrow canal, the obstruction was located and cleared. A certain amount of silting has occurred above Lock 3 due to the lack of use and it was impossible to get close to the bank at our destination. However, a plank was soon secured and we were ready to receive the cargo.

Many surprised faces from the office windows watched the loading and then two directors arrived with the company photographer and part of the cargo had to be unloaded and then reloaded for his benefit. Fortunately, extruded plastic wastebins are very light!

Then off back to the Festival site with the sheets battened down and everyone on board. The locks behaved perfectly on the way back, the only trouble coming from that wind funnel out of Whitelands Tunnel. Leaving Lock 2, a plastic bag caught around the prop, and without power, Joel was blown towards the new factories on the canalside. Demolition of the old buildings had caused debris to fall into the canal at this point and British Waterways have not chased the culprits hard enough. The result was that the bow went well and truly aground. A spate of heavy pushing on poles and boathooks (and a certain amount of muted bad language) got us back under way in about ten minutes. From then on a clear run under the Asda Tunnel and back to the aqueduct to unload. A couple of boaters had to be told, quite firmly, that this was a working boat actually working and therefore took precedence over their pleasure!

The cost of this trip was calculated on the 1870 Scale of Charges. The cargo weighed well under a ton, but the Festival Committee felt that we should pay for the full ton and going through the three locks gave three lock/miles. The rate for miscellaneous cargo was $^{1}/_{2}$ d. per ton mile, so the Festival Secretary handed over three-halpence to Bill to pay for the trip. Comment from the Skipper was: "Another job I think I've lost money on."

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On the weekend of 8th-9th September the refurbished Tunnel End Cottages were reopened.

"A fine example of partnership in action."

That was the description used by Coun. Tom O'Donovan when, with the Mayoress Mrs. Eileen O'Donovan, he officially reopened the completely refurbished Canal and Countryside Centre at Tunnel End. Marsden.

The event was linked with an HCS festival, the principal organiser being Publicity Officer and Marsden Moor National Trust Warden David Finnis. The general consensus of opinion about

the two-day event was that a good time was had by all, and it was money well spent.

Coun. O'Donovan praised HCS chairman David Sumner, who said that the venture was all about co-operation. (Pause here to explain that the £30,000 plus funding for the facelift has come from Kirklees Council, HCS, the National Trust, private sponsorship and the Countryside Commission).

David gave a potted history of what had been achieved in the restoration drive so far – it is nine years since the first constructive moves were made by HCS volunteers – and said that the re-opening campaign had also been a fine example of co-operation in action. Pam Whittaker of the National Trust added her appreciation of what has been achieved in making Tunnel End Cottages a much more interesting facility for the area. The Centre, which has been attracting about 40,000 visitors a year, now has vastly superior facilities. Sue McBride, responsible for the re-vamped displays has, naturally, concentrated on the canal theme, linking the building and use of the Narrow Canal with

the development of trade and industry in the Colne Valley. There has been structural safety work and the addition of a multi-media audio visual room with a classroom and activity centre for the use of visiting school groups. There

is also a shop with helpful and well-informed staff. There is no doubt that the new-look centre will be a big attraction, both as a way of learning more about the canal era and the industrial history of the Colne Valley, and as a pleasant amenity.

Countryside Officer Neil Windett said it was regretted by both the Council and the Canal Society that the Centre had had to be closed to the public for the work to be completed at the busiest time of the year – but there had been no option. Last winter emergency structural repairs had to be carried out instead of the planned refurbishment. And it was only recently that it had been possible to generate sufficient finance and commission a designer of high enough standard.

The opening ceremony saw VIP's cruising to Tunnel End from Lock 42E. British Waterways loaned a "flat bottomer" for the main party with the Mayor being given a sharp lesson in tiller steering by BW's Fred Carter, and HCS's Boat No. 2 was drafted in with Frank Smith at the outboard, to take overflow guests.





For those of you who peruse the sales list, you will notice a few alterations, the first being that we are now sold out (bar one or two) of the Huddersfield Towpath Guide. This book was published about nine or ten years ago and, as so much of the canal is now restored, it is quite a historic piece of writing. The other important alteration is due to matters beyond my control, and is unfortunately a price rise. As from November, I am afraid all tee shirts and sweatshirts are going up in price. This is the first price rise of these items since I took over from Jean in 1987, so I'm sure you won't think too badly of us!






